Caring for Pets and

APS-FH provides loving care, socialization and enrichment, and onsite medical care to homeless dogs and cats, ensuring each animal their best opportunity for a happy, comfortable, and healthy life while working to adopt them into loving homes.

We work with the San Juan County Sheriff's Office, providing animal protection services to lost, stray, abandoned, and mistreated dogs and cats on San Juan Island. While our mission is to "provide compassionate care and brighter futures to homeless animals," our mission naturally extends to pet owners as well.

The Pet Food Pantry (PFP) is just one of our programs designed to help keep pets in their homes by providing pet food and other pet supplies to low-income households. The APS-FH PFP served 93 unique households with 248 cats and 77 dogs in 2021. The pantry

runs out of our Treasure Hounds store and is open every other Wednesday from 11am-2pm.



82 dogs and 103 cats were adopted from APS-7H in 2021. These are just a few of the happy pets and their new families!

Tansy




Tansy was adopted on 8/3/21. She was previously very skittish and wouldn't let anyone touch her.



Our Community Too

Our Trap, Neuter, Return (TNR)

Program is APS-FH's humane
solution to the community cat (feral),
overbreeding problem. This program
stops breeding by trapping, spaying/
neutering, vaccinating, ear-tipping and
returning cats to their original location
with a caregiver who agrees to provide
them with food, water, and shelter.

The APS-FH Low-Cost Spay/Neuter Clinic provides affordable spay/neuter surgery, vaccinations, microchipping for dogs and cats of qualifying, low-income San Juan County residents and other local shelters/rescue groups.



APS-FH provides Outreach and Education to the community on issues that impact companion animals. Our annual "Spay"ghetti Dinner is a community gathering and forum to provide resources and promote the importance of spaying/neutering companion animals to help reduce unintended litters and the euthanasia rates in shelters. And we promote year-round pet safety through the sale of county dog licenses, microchipping through our Low-Cost Spay/Neuter Clinic, and education campaigns.

Why We Transport Animals

Shelter animals come to APS-FH through local surrenders, unclaimed strays, kittens of island cat colonies, and transports from overpopulated or disaster-impacted shelters and rescues.

Spay/neuter rates are high in Western Washington. We have less pet overpopulation than Eastern Washington and other states in the U.S. and Mexico where euthanasia rates are very high.

On San Juan Island, there is a high demand for adoptable animals, which far outweighs our island's number of either unwanted or homeless animals. We want to save as many dogs and cats as we possibly can and in order to do this we transport animals from other places to APS-FH.

Transporting animals is not something we do casually. It takes a balancing act to keep the shelter full of available,

adoptable animals while maintaining open kennels for the local needs that arise.

When we do transport...

We work with trusted shelter and rescue partners who do behavior assessments, and properly vet animals so we have confidence in the animals' general health.

We work with humane transport organizations so we know the animals are riding in comfort, and are given proper care and attention to their needs.

We only engage in transports that are budget-friendly so we are using our resources effectively.

In 2021, the APS-FH transport program worked with 11 different transport partners, saved 134 animals, and brightened the lives of the people who adopted them.

Our Current Project

Exercise Yard Safety & Hygiene

Daily exercise is critical for the physical and mental health of shelter animals. While cats and kittens cavort around multilevel platforms inside, dogs need to go out to the exercise yard.

PROBLEM: The current yard has poor drainage and during the rainy season is muddy with pooled water contaminated from feces. About 60% of the dogs transported test positive for giardia or coccidia, a highly contagious parasite that lives in soil and other organic compounds. Also, many dogs, especially puppies, eat the woodchips which can cause diarrhea and life-threatening obstructions.

Woodchips and natural grass cannot be cleaned and sanitized to eliminate parasites and disease. Concrete gets hot in summer and is rough on paws.

SOLUTION: Additional drainage can be installed to reduce standing water. Artificial turf offers the best solution, as it is easy to clean and sanitize. It provides good drainage, is soft on paws, feels natural for playing but does not need watering or mowing. Dogs get more exercise time, stay healthier, and staff spends more time interacting with them.

Healthy, happy dogs and puppies get adopted!

Volunteer of the Year 2021





Renee and Brittany volunteer as expert cat trappers for APS-FH's TNR (Trap, Neuter, Return) program as well as experienced kitten foster parents through our Foster Program. These angels recently moved to San Juan Island from California, where they volunteered for years with their local rescue. Brittany and Renee got into cat trapping after fostering hundreds of kittens for the rescue and deciding they wanted to do more to prevent the birth of unwanted kittens. So far, Brittany and Renee have helped trap and fix over 70 Island cats and have fostered dozens and dozens of island kittens!

Cat trapping requires early mornings, long hours, great patience, the hauling of lots of supplies, and excellent communication with the shelter and the feline's care providers. It's not for everyone, but these two do it with big smiles and love in their hearts for the cats and kittens.

Sometimes kittens are trapped before they are weaned, this requires that Renee and Brittany provide care for them around the clock. During "kitten season" there are felines in their bedrooms and bathrooms, they drive them back and forth to the shelter for medical care and vaccines, and, when they are ready to be adopted, Renee and Brittany open their home to potential adopters.

Thanks so much, Renee and Brittany, for making a difference in the lives of literally hundreds of feral and shelter felines. You deserve to be recognized and celebrated.

My favorite? Just look at the other end of the leash!



I had no idea how much I would enjoy being a shelter volunteer! I began volunteering this past summer, working specifically on socializing with the cats waiting for homes. I was new to the island and wanted to get to know the island's people and organizations. However, what keeps me volunteering now is the sheer joy of working with the kitties, and with people who care so deeply about the island's animals.

There's nothing more satisfying than meeting a frightened kitten and teaching it that the world is not such a scary place after all. Everyone at the shelter gets so excited when a kitten gets to finally go home with their very own family to love them.

My favorite, though, is an older cat named Tiramisu. We don't know what her life was like before the shelter, but she's very scared of just about everything, and she runs and hisses at the slightest noise or at any new person. But at the same time, she clearly longs for petting - and once she gets in your lap, she'll reach up and gently pat your face, as if to say hello, and suddenly there's a beautiful little oasis of peace for both of us.

The staff team taught me to wait for Tiramisu to feel comfortable enough to come to me. It took weeks, but now she jumps up on me as soon as she sees me. She's been at the shelter a long time since she's so scared when she meets new people, but I hope she'll find a home soon where she can have the space, she needs to learn to trust people again.

Volunteer Opportunities

Shelter Aide

Assists with general shelter duties including cleaning, organizing, sorting, and helping shelter staff with special projects.

Facility Maintenance

General facility maintenance and repairs - we need you!

Dog Socialization and Walking

Walks shelter dogs and/or plays with dogs in the yard, may create and implement enrichment activities, works with dogs on training as instructed and when necessary.

Cat Socializer

Spends time brushing, petting, talking to and socializing shelter cats.

Clinic Aide

Assists shelter Vet and Vet Tech on surgery days, cares for animals recovering from surgery, cleans and maintains surgical suite and equipment.

Special Events

Helps at fundraising events and assists with set up, tear down, and event promotion.

Receptionist/Greeter

Greets customers and answers phones – retrieves appropriate staff to assist. Performs other clerical duties.

Foster Parent

Our Foster Program places current shelter animals in temporary homes. Foster families help to house ill or injured animals, animals stressed by being in a kennel, or underage puppies and kittens with or without a mom. Not only is this in the best interest of the individual animal, but it also provides more room at the shelter for additional animals in need.


Transport


Using the shelter van or personal vehicle of appropriate size travels off-island to take pets to partner shelters or pick up pets being transferred to our shelter from a partner shelter. Locations for pick-ups/drop-offs vary from Anacortes, Skagit County, or the greater Seattle area. Occasionally longer trips are necessary.

San Juan Island Community Foundation (SJICF) Virtual Fair

Again, this year, the SJICF sponsored a "virtual fair." Thanks to SJICF and your support, we met our goal of raising \$14,650 to provide healthy nourishment and enrichment care (food, beds, blankets, scratching posts, treats, chews and toys) to our shelter animals for the coming year.

Doggone Good Dinner

The Doggone Good Dinner is our annual event held at Duck Soup. Unfortunately, we have had to cancel this event two years in a row due to COVID. Dog gone it! Our budgeted goal was to raise \$80,000 at this year's dinner. Funds from this event are earmarked for operations - everything from veterinary care to keeping the lights on.

So what do dogs do to keep their heads above water? They do the "Dog Paddle!" That's exactly what we did – so far, our community has raised its paddles to help APS-FH raise over \$58,000 toward our goal.
