In our 2021 Annual Report, we highlighted the major health issues with our shelter's dog exercise yards. The problem was poor drainage which could leave our puppies with serious diseases.

Our extensive research revealed that there was only one viable solution – artificial turf. Artificial turf is easy to clean and sanitize, provides good drainage, is soft on paws, and feels natural for playing. Thanks to the generosity of our community, we were able to complete the project in spring of 2022.

Also last year, the building which housed Treasure Hounds, our upscale resale shop, was listed for sale. After much study and deliberation, we purchased the building, thus ensuring this very important funding resource will continue. You can read more about Treasure Hounds later in this report.

I hope our "2022 Annual Report" provides you with more information about all the work we are doing at APS-FH and all of the people who help make it possible.

Please take a special look at the pictures...In the "Happily Home" stories, you can literally see the joy and peace in the animals' faces and the love in the hearts of those who have adopted a pet.

A letter from our Executive Director Cristin Felso

Over the past few years, APS-FH has gone through a period of self-reflection and growth. In 2019 during a two-day staff retreat, we reviewed and rated APS-FH shelter operations using a tool for self-assessment and improvement, "The ASV Guidelines for Standards of Care in Animal Shelters." We found there were things we were doing well and areas where we could improve. Since then, we have developed and written over one hundred policies and procedures that now guide the quality, consistency, and integrity of our service delivery.

We are fortunate to have an incredible team of passionate, skilled, and dedicated staff and volunteers who deliver on the promises we make to our community and our animals we protect. We could not exist without you.

Gratitude goes to those who founded APS-FH, created its mission providing services to our animals and community and helped build this beautiful shelter. From this solid foundation, we have been able to turn our focus outward, developing new and enhancing our existing community services and building partnerships to serve even more companion animals and their humans.

Established in 2021, the APS-FH Low-Cost Spay/Neuter Clinic has become a valuable countywide resource serving animals and people from Orcas, Lopez, and San Juan Islands. In 2023, our goal is to provide twice-a-year Pet Wellness Clinics for qualifying low-income households.

We are proud to be building a network of San Juan County, North Central, and Eastern Washington shelter/rescue partners that is expanding our capacity to save more animals across Washington State; addressing the significant overpopulation of homeless animals that exists in our state.

In 2022, we embarked on a major fundraising effort to complete the shelter's dog yards as they were originally intended. Thanks to all who supported this campaign. We were able to install high-quality dog turf in the yards and the health, safety, and enjoyment for the dogs is vastly improved.

When the condo that houses our Treasure Hounds store went up for sale, we took out a loan to purchase it. The store is a significant source of funding for APS-FH and a sound investment. Treasure Hounds provides 24% of APS-FH's operating funds. We love that this is funding generated by the community who donate home good items, those who shop with us, and the incredible team of volunteers who help run the store. Thank you for your generosity!

The economy is a bit worrisome this year. We are all facing increasing costs and particularly, for APS-FH, our pet food and medical supply costs have skyrocketed. We have built out our services considerably over the past few years. Our plan for 2023 is to build deep, fine tune operations and assure we are delivering the highest quality of all our services.

Your support is our catalyst. We hope you are inspired by this report to begin, continue, or renew your support of APS-FH. Every gift matters and every gift is appreciated!

What's Going on Nationally?

Data from "Shelter Animals Count" - The national database of sheltered animal statistics

3rd Quarter Insights:

- There are 7.3% more animals entering shelters than leaving so far this year, up from 6% in the Q2 report (Jan-Jun). While this is forecasted to improve slightly by the end of the year at 5%, this is still the largest gap in the past 4 years
- Stray dogs and owner surrendered cats are entering shelters at their highest rate in 4 years
- Compared to 2019, the number of animals entering shelters has decreased 17%, while total outcomes have decreased at an even higher rate of 20%, meaning more animals are staying in shelters now than before the pandemic

Adoption Process

We view adoptions as "matchmaking". We try to make the perfect "match" so the animal has the happily-ever-after home they deserve and you bring home the pet that is the right fit for you, your lifestyle and your family.

Our Adoption Team will advocate for the pet's needs and be transparent about their medical and behavioral history. The entire process can take some time, but it's well worth it!

The following is our step-by-step process to adopt a rescue pet from APS-FH.

- Visit the shelter, social media pages and/or our website to view available pets for adoption.
- Submit an application online or in person for the pet that interests you.
- 3. Applications are thoughtfully and

- carefully reviewed by our Adoption Team to make the best match possible for both you and the pet.
- 4. Once the application is reviewed, a meet and greet appointment is made for a one-on-one visit with the dog at APS-FH during business hours. Cats housed at the shelter are available for drop-in visits during business hours. If the dog or cat is with a foster parent, arrangements will be made with the foster parent for you to meet the pet.
- 5. After the review and initial meet and greet, follow-up conversations and/or counseling sessions with an Adoption Team Member may take place. Additional meet and greet sessions may be required for specific placements or multi-pet households. You may want to come back for another visit with the pet

- to make sure the adoption is the right decision for you.
- 6. Final step..Adoption! If we don't have a match, we will keep your application on file until the right pet comes along. Always feel free to come and talk to us about your future pet! We are here to answer all your questions. We love matchmaking!

APS-7H is committed to providing our shelter pets with loving and forever homes.



Thank You to Our Special Friday Harbor High School Volunteers

Each year we are fortunate to have local high school students select APS-FH as the organization with which to partner for their community service projects. This year, Elsa Kindelberger and Bryce Rhodes chose to do a food drive for the APS-FH Pet Food Pantry (PFP).

The students designed marketing materials, colorfully decorated donation collection boxes, and outreached to local businesses; Kings Market, Friday Harbor Market Place, and Friday Harbor Pet Supplies, who agreed to support their efforts by hosting donation boxes in their stores.

The drive ran for two weeks, culminating in 228 total items donated including 187 cans of cat and dog food, 120.15 pounds of dog and cat kibble, and a variety of other items such as pet supplements, and treats and chews.

Elsa had this to say about her project experience, "I was really happy to see the amount of people willing to donate to help animals and that love animals, just like me. I have adopted multiple pets from the shelter and have always loved animals so I knew I would want my project to be based around helping shelter animals, which I was able to do."

Jon and Kris Zerby are this year's Volunteers of the Year because of their Iong-time dedication, loyalty and years of service to APS-7H.

Jon served as an APS-FH Board Member from 2016 to 2022, but this husband-wife duo has been volunteering for APS-FH for many years; before Jon served on the board; even before APS-FH had a formal volunteer program! Jon and Kris have volunteered at community gatherings and fundraising events, walked dogs and visited with cats, helped with repairs and ran odd errands and, generally, have jumped in to do whatever was needed over the years.

Their latest volunteer adventure is running our Pet Food Pantry (PFP) with their APS-FH alumni dog, June. The Pet Food Pantry provides free pet food and supplies to pet families in need. Program patrons must be low-income, and their pets spayed or neutered. The Zerby's uphold these program requirements with kindness and diplomacy.

Jon and Kris pick up pantry food and supply donations from the shelter and take them to Treasure Hounds. Here they bag the cat and dog kibble, organize and stock the pantry shelves, work at the pantry handing out food and supplies, and provide extensive statistics to help us fundraise for the program. While doing this work, they are constantly seeking avenues and resources to better meet the needs of the people and pets they serve.

In 2020, the Zerby's advocated for the PFP's hours of operation to be lined up with those of the Food Bank, making it more accessible for patrons of both services.

In 2021, they initiated a collaboration with Meals on Wheels to send Pet Food Pantry food and supplies home to Meals on Wheels patrons with pets.

Recently, the availability of pet food has been inconsistent, and the prices have increased dramatically. Jon and Kris regularly go off island on a nearly all-day hunt to numerous stores for pet food for the program.

"It is the best job I never had. Every related hour is a pleasure," says Kris about their PFP volunteer experience, demonstrating further the incredible spirit the Zerbys bring to the work.

Thank you, Jon, Kris and June for being the friendly faces and the wagging tail behind the APS-FH Pet Food Pantry and for all your service over the years that has undoubtedly provided hope and happy homes for thousands of dogs and cats!

Volunteer Opportunities

Shelter Volunteer

Assists with general shelter duties including cleaning, organizing, sorting, and helping shelter staff with special projects. May help socialize cats including brushing, petting, and implementing enrichment – our cats love and benefit from playtime. May help take a shelter dog on a long walk and/or play with them in the yard, create and implement enrichment activities, and/or work with dogs on training as guided by our staff.

Facility Maintenance

General facility maintenance and repairs - we need you at the shelter and Treasure Hounds!

Clinic Aide

Assists Shelter Vet and Vet Tech pre, during, and postsurgery days, cares for animals recovering from surgery, cleans and maintains surgical suite and equipment.

Special Events

Helps at fundraising events and assists with set up, tear down, and event promotion.

Receptionist/Greeter

Greets customers and answers phones - retrieves appropriate staff to assist when necessary. Performs various clerical duties.

Foster Parent

Our Foster Program places current shelter animals in temporary homes. Foster families help to house ill or injured animals, animals stressed by being in a kennel, or underage puppies and kittens with or without a mom. Not only is this in the best interest of the individual animal, but it also provides more room at the shelter for additional animals in need.

Transport

Using the shelter van or personal vehicle of appropriate size, travels off island to take animals to partner shelters or pick up animals being transferred to our shelter from a partner shelter. Locations for pickups/drop-offs vary from Anacortes, Skagit County, or the Greater Seattle area. Occasionally longer trips are necessary.

Treasure Hounds

Provides customer service at our upscale resale store - assisting customers while shopping, sorting, cleaning, pricing, setting up displays, and organizing donated merchandise, may assist with delivery and/or procurement of donations.

Caring for Pets and Our Community Too

APS-FH is committed to providing programs and services that:

- Reduce pet overpopulation through spay/neuter resources
- Provide a safe haven and care for unwanted pets
- · Offer adoption of homeless pets to those who truly care
- Protect animals from neglect abuse and abandonment
- · Advance animal welfare through educational and direct assistance
- · Promote a stronger sense for animal and human interaction
- · Always adhere to our no-kill philosophy

While our mission is to "provide compassionate care and brighter futures to homeless animals," our mission naturally extends to pet owners as well.

The Pet Food Pantry

The Pet Food Pantry is a community pet food bank to help keep pets in their homes by providing pet food for low-income families in



need. The Pet Food Pantry is located at the Treasure Hounds store at 365-C Spring Street in Friday Harbor. Pet food distribution happens every other Wednesday from 11am to 2pm. Both cat and dog food as well as other basic pet supplies are available.

Participants must be 18 years or older to receive goods, have proof of island residency and also have proof that your pets are spayed or neutered. (If they are not, APS-FH can help!)

APS-FH gratefully accepts both cash and pet food donations to keep the program going. Cash donations are great because we have access to buy at a discount rate, however, any non-expired canned and dry pet foods are also desired.

Foster Care Program

APS-FH's Foster Care Program places orphaned, pregnant, newborn, injured, sick, and under-socialized animals into private homes for temporary housing. Some of the shelter's most vulnerable residents benefit tremendously from foster care, which provides them with time outside of the shelter for recovery from an illness or injury, or to receive extra attention and socialization. Foster care can also give us an opportunity to learn more about the animals in our care by giving us a glimpse into how they behave in a house setting or with a transition into a home environment (as they will experience upon adoption). The Foster Care Program also allows us to help more animals than we have room to house in our brick and mortar facility.

Trap, Neuter/Spay, Return (TNR)

APS-FH promotes TNR as the humane solution to the community cat overpopulation problem. TNR is a program that stops the breeding of cats by trapping, spaying or neutering and then returning the cats to their original location (when possible).

This Program:

- ends the breeding cycle and stabilizes the population
- is more effective and humane than extermination
- eliminates or minimizes annoying behaviors such as spraying, yowling and fighting.
- reduces the number of underage kittens flooding animal shelters.

How Does it Work?

TRAP: The cats are humanely trapped.

NEUTER: The cats are taken to APS-FH where our vet then spays/neuters them. The left ear is "tipped" so people will recognize they have been sterilized and not attempt to trap them again.

RETURN: The cats are returned to their caregivers, who agree to continue to provide them with food, water and some type of necessary shelter. Other options are to relocate them to properties and barns where they can be "working cats."

Why is TNR Important?

Cats can breed as early as four months of age and can produce multiple litters in one year. If nothing is done to sterilize colonies of community cats, the problem will most likely reach unmanageable levels and lead to unnecessary suffering.

APS-FH Low-Cost Spay/Neuter Clinic

Our Low-Cost Spay/Neuter Clinic helps provide underserved San Juan County residents with affordable spay/neuter surgery options for their dogs and cats, as well as additional services such as vaccines and microchipping at the time of spay/neuter. The Low-Cost S/N Clinic also assists other local rescue organizations and shelters by providing clinic services for their animals at a discounted rate, relieving the stress of adopting out unspayed/neutered pets into communities.

Our clinic runs once a week, typically on Tuesdays. Low-income community members of San Juan County can call the shelter at (360)378-2158 to get more information, or to put their name on a short waiting list for the clinic.

Mom's Last Litter

Mom's Last Litter is a free program designed to help pet owners safely and responsibly respond to accidental pregnancies and prevent future pregnancies.

Owners agree to foster the entire litter of puppies and kittens until each reaches the age and size required for spay/neuter surgery. At this time, the entire litter and the mother (as well as father, if owned) come to APS-FH to receive FREE spay/neuter surgeries. After surgery, the parent animals return to the owner, and the entire litter remains at APS-FH to be matched with forever homes.

Additional vaccinations and microchipping services can be purchased for the mom/dad at the time of surgery.

Senior-to-Senior

This program waives the adoption fee for low-income senior citizens adopting senior pets. The program is for anyone over age 65 who adopts a pet seven years or older and who meets the local threshold as lowincome. In addition to a waived adoption fee, the Senior-to-Senior Program will assist senior citizens in keeping their pets happy and healthy with a variety of supportive services that are available upon request. Please contact the shelter if you are a Senior Citizen with an APS-FH adopted senior pet and you need and would like support services.

Cremation Services

Pet loss can be traumatizing, heartbreaking, stressful, and, sometimes, expensive. APS-FH is proud to announce that we have partnered with Radiant Heart After-Care for Pets to provide compassionate and affordable cremation services to San Juan Island residents. Radiant Heart, located in Bellingham, Washington, is a pet funeral home with on-site cremation,

offering personal and respectful care for you and your pet. They provide eco-friendly cremation and traditional flame cremation as well as many additional products and services to honor your pet. Radiant Heart visits APS-FH multiple times a month, therefore your loved one's cremains are always returned in a timely manner. Cremation services are currently available to all community members regardless of income status; prices range depending on the type of cremation (communal vs. private), size of the pet, and any additional services requested. Call APS-FH to learn more about this new service and visit Radiant Heart's website at https://radiant-heart.net/ to learn more about their process.

APS-FH does not currently offer euthanasia services to owned pets. Any pets brought in for cremation services will have had to pass away naturally or humanely euthanized by your regular vet.


Missing Pets

Your pet goes missing, what do you do? Let APS-FH know! We are here to assist and offer advice with reuniting pets with their guardians. Here are the steps you should take if your pet goes missing:

- Check inside/outside your house thoroughly, including closets, crawl spaces, outbuildings, under decks, etc.
- 2. Check in with your neighbors to see if there have been any recent sightings. If your neighborhood has an HOA or neighborhood email chain, alert the folks living closest to you about your missing pet.
- 3. Call APS-FH to report your pet missing (360) 378-2158. Your

- pet may have been brought into the shelter as a stray. APS-FH also keeps a Missing Pet Log and closely monitors community social media pages for posts on pets if your pet has not already been brought in. We can offer tips to help your pet find its way back home.
- 4. Call the San Juan County Sheriff Office's non-emergency number to report lost dogs (360) 378-4151. SJCSO is acting animal control and responsible for picking up/assisting with any animals at large. On occasion, they will assist with reuniting dogs with their guardians before bringing them into the shelter.
- 5. Use community social media pages or post physical signs to help spread the word that your pet is missing. Make a post or poster using a photo of your pet, the area your pet was last seen, your contact information, and any other relevant information about the situation. Facebook groups such as "SJ Pets" and "What's Up Friday Harbor" help spread the word throughout the community that your pet is lost and in need of assistance. APS-FH can also "share" your post on our Facebook page.
- 6. If your pet is brought into the shelter, APS-FH will do everything in its power to reunite you with your family member. Things you can do to help speed up the reunification process:
 - Ensure your pet is wearing proper identification (SJC license or pet tag).
 - Microchip your pet and make sure the information is up to date.
 - Call APS-FH and report your pet missing.





Diagnostics, medication, dental work, surgeries, pediatric/ geriatric and advanced specialty care adds up for 500 animals - our actual medical budget totals over \$24,000 annually.

This year, thanks to you, APS raised over \$11,000 to help provide medical care for over 500 shelter animals.

Proceeds from the campaign enabled us to purchase an animal incubator, which was put to use within 24 hours of its arrival to save the lives of a litter of neonatal kittens brought in from the island.
