A letter from our Executive Director Cristin Felso

As I reflect on my sixth year as Executive Director of APS-FH, the journey has been a profound learning experience. Starting with a background in nonprofit leadership and a lifelong passion for animals, my lack of formal animal-related work experience didn't deter me. Instead, every day working closely with the animal care and medical teams, engaging with our community, and collaborating with our dedicated Board and advisory committees has been a continuous source of learning and motivation.

We have been listening to our community, and in 2023, we responded by reaching out with more programs and services to support pet families experiencing financial insecurity, sudden transition, or emergency circumstances. This outreach wasn't a solo effort; we fostered collaboration with local nonprofits and strengthened ties with the County Sheriff's Department, also increasing the effectiveness of our role in "animal control" and advocacy.

The year 2023 saw us invest in outreach, education, and our team. This strategic move resulted in increased community involvement, institutional growth, and the retention and recruitment of skilled staff. Key to this success was the addition of Katy Brooks as our new Medical Supervisor, overseeing medical care for shelter pets and clinic services to the community. Leveraging Intel Cogenerate grant funds, we brought in a consultant from Intel to modernize our volunteer program, transitioning it from paper to a digital app. This upgrade improved volunteer communications, orientation, training, and crucially, time tracking – vital data for our fundraising efforts.

Looking forward, our fundraising focus for the upcoming year will include addressing the debt on the condo housing our Treasure Hounds resale store. This asset not only contributes significantly to our operating expenses but also serves as storage and distribution space for the Pet Food Pantry. Moreover, it functions as a versatile community hub, offering a venue for gatherings, daily engagement generating donations, and attracting potential adopters. This comprehensive approach to fundraising aligns with our commitment to sustaining and expanding our impactful initiatives. We are also building a Legacy Giving Society to help secure the mission of APS-FH for years to come.

As I embark on another year leading APS-FH, I am inspired by the collective efforts and achievements of our team. The strides we've made in community engagement, program expansion, and strategic partnerships underscore our commitment to the welfare of animals and our community. Looking ahead, we remain dedicated to learning, evolving, and making a positive impact. Together, we aim to build on our successes, address challenges, and continue serving as a beacon of support for both animals and the families that cherish them. Here's to another year of growth, compassion, and shared accomplishments.

Adopted September 2023, ~2-year-old pit bull mix - transferred into our care by way of Project Freedom Ride from a high-kill shelter in Georgia. Bella arrived at the Georgia shelter as a stray, and due to her length of time at the shelter and lack of space, Bella found herself on the euthanasia list.

Despite Bella proving to be a perfect girl, who got along with everyone (human, stranger, or fellow dog), she unfortunately had no adoption interest, and so euthanasia seemed inevitable.

Ultimately, we're happy to share that wasn't the end of Bella's story! With the life-saving transport work of Project Freedom Ride, Bella came to us and in turn had a second chance at being adopted. Luckily, Bella only had to wait another two months after arriving at APS-FH before a family all her own came to adopt her!

Now, Bella happily lives as a part of the Danforth Family on Lopez Island, and everyone is completely smitten with her, and she is smitten with all of them! The Danforths said that from the moment they got her, it was clear she was going to fit right in. The whole trip home was spent snuggling the kids in the backseat, and she loves to cozy up and cuddle with anyone who is willing. In addition to cuddling, Bella loves so many things about her new life on Lopez, including time at the beach, going on walks and runs and playing fetch, and meeting and making new friends! She's even been super kind and respectfully curious with the Danforth's three cats, whom she has won over one-by-one.

Bingsley



Adopted November 2023, was just a 3.5-weekold kitten when found under a person's house along with his two littermates, Elizabeth and Mr. Darcy (named after characters in Pride & Prejudice).

After being found outside and brought into the shelter, Bingsley was sent to foster care for continued support. It was there he, along with his two littermates, were formula fed, transitioned onto wet food and kibble, kept healthy and monitored closely for infectious disease, and socialized until they became old enough for adoption. Before even being old enough, Bingsley was already spoken for, which meant right at 8 weeks of age he got to go to his new loving home!

Since being adopted, we've heard this awesome update from his people: "He is loving his new family - he has big brother Kenai, who does a great job of demonstrating boundaries, and big sister Nootka, who bathes him and teaches him the art of wrestling. He loves birdwatching, snuggling on the left shoulder, and figuring out how high he can climb on any vertical surface."

The animals pictured were compassionately sheltered and cared for at APS-7H, then adopted into loving homes.

Their ability to forgive the hardships they have experienced and to open their hearts to love again is remarkable. We stay in touch with their adopters and get to hear about the many ways they touch the lives of the people who take them home.

Boo



Adopted September 2023, female senior cat surrendered to our shelter. Boo came with a medical chart that showed an aging body. For all her medical reasons, we know that an adoption for Boo would require someone who was understanding of her age and medical need; and up for providing the level of support and love she would require in her senior years.

Boo, an all-black female senior cat, was surrendered to our shelter in June 2023. She was in need of support and in search of her next chapter. APS-FH staff and volunteers, and all who came and met her when she was the official hallway cat in our community cat area, fell in love with Boo instantly. The more time we spent with Boo, the more we knew this special girl deserved special placement.

So, now knowing all we knew about Boo, imagine our excitement when we received a message from Cascade Pet Hospital saying they were interested in adopting Boo as a live-in clinic cat who would serve as their Chief Morale Officer! Less than two weeks after that initial message, Boo was going "home." Talk about a happy ending!

About a month after her adoption, we received the following update from Boo's adopters, the Cascade Pet Hospital team:

"So far, she has been doing well. She is definitely having a hard time moving around but uses her stairs and has claimed the break room table as her favorite spot to nap." With medication they are working to manage her fairly severe hip dysplasia. Additionally, after noticing she was in pain while eating, they performed a dental procedure to extract six of her teeth. "She did great under anesthesia and is feeling much better. Her bloodwork is perfect and she even enjoyed her first outdoor walk on a harness in the sunshine. Everyone is completely in love with her, so she is constantly getting pets."

Porter (was Amelie)



Adopted February 2023, bulldog mix puppy - transferred to us via plane in mass rescue effort from Louisiana. Porter (then Amelie) came to APS-FH alongside her littermates, and after some time spent in quarantine at the shelter, they were placed into foster care until they could be successfully adopted.

At two months of age Porter (then Amelie) entered foster care with a local island couple and their three cats. And just a few short weeks later, that foster family would turn into Porter's adopted family. That's what we call a "foster fail", and in reference to it, Porter's new mom Sarah says she's "never been so proud to fail at something!"

Porter is one lucky pup who gets to have Lime Kiln State Park as her backyard, thanks to one of her parents being a park ranger! This means Porter can often be found spending her days exploring state parks, watching orcas from the shore, or making pals with those she meets on her adventures.

When not exploring the outdoors, Porter can be found spending time at home with her beloved cat siblings: Asparagus (Gus), Violet, and Herbert (Herb or Herby). Porter's parents, Dylan and Sarah, say "Porter thinks she is one of the cats, it's so funny." Who can blame Porter for being just one of the cool cats at this point? We're all just glad to see Porter being loved so fully by every cat and human, in her family!

Valla (was Vala)



Adopted September 2023, locally surrendered ~5-year-old lab mix who was a bit of an anxious girl. With her anxieties in mind, we knew she as a special case who was looking for a home that was safe, dependable, and compassionate. Valla waited 8 months in our shelter, but ultimately it was all worth the wait when the Sanders family welcomed her into a home of her own!

After the Sanders family adopted Vala, they added a second 'L' to her name (now Valla/Valhalla) because of their family's Nordic roots, and before long sent us a glowing update to let us know Valla was doing great in her new home:

"She settled in very quickly, finding a place on the couch to basically claim (and bury her head when playing). She's begun doing 'zoomies' after only a few days, and loves to blast around our yard doing figure eights until she lays in the sun and rolls around.

As to Valla's nervous nature, she is coming along fantastically. We go on about three walks a day and have even ventured downtown a few times. She has kind of transitioned from being jumpy and nervous at people and dogs to being very curious from a distance. She'll jump occasionally at unfamiliar noises, like stepping on a manhole cover, but overall, as long as she's kept on a short leash and by your side, she'll drop her ears back, listen, but keep jogging along. It's also kind of funny because sometimes she'll be walking and her tail will curl under her as if she were afraid, but as soon as you ask (rhetorically) 'is Valla walking?' she pops into the air and wags like crazy. All in all, Valla is the perfect dog and we (and we think she) couldn't be happier."

What's Going on Nationally

- The number of animals entering shelters through community intakes in 2023 remained roughly the same as 2022 at 6.5 million, with intakes nearly evenly split between dogs and cats.
- A total of 900,000 animals have entered and lingered in our nation's shelters and rescues since January 2021. This surplus is on top of the population already residing within organizations, resulting in an ongoing capacity crisis.
- While 2.2 million dogs were adopted in 2023, dog adoptions are still 5% lower than in 2019. Cats are experiencing a more hopeful trend: 2.6 million cats were adopted in 2023,14% more than 2019. The number of dogs euthanized (359,000 dogs) surpassed the number of cats euthanized (330,000 cats). Shelter euthanasia represents 9% of total intakes.

Bringing Home a Rescue

Bringing home a rescue is exciting!

It's understandable to want to show your newly adopted dog or cat to the world and show the world to it in return, but please remember that no matter how close you may already feel to your new family member, you, your house, and everything in it, are foreign to it. New pets need time to adjust and decompress, just like when we move into a new home.

If possible, take some time off to bond, help your new pet transition and establish good behaviors and routines. Prepare your home in advance. What would make your new pet feel more comfortable? Are there any stressors you could reduce? Are there dangerous items that need to be stowed away or places that need to be blocked off? Does your pet have a quiet area and 'safe space' away from foot traffic and other animals?

There's a lot that goes into adopting a rescue pet. To help adopters and new rescue animals, APS-FH likes to refer to the 3-3-3 rule. This rule measures in increments of three, the time it will take for your cat or dog to decompress and acclimate to its new life.

3 Days 📽

The first three days are for your new rescue to decompress and get used to all the new changes in its life. There's a lot to take in and the animal can easily become over-stimulated. It may be nervous or even scared. While it adjusts to its new home and family, please have friends and extended family wait to visit. Start your animal out in a quiet place in the house, one that is only for them. Make sure it is comfortable and in an area that has low traffic, away from other animals. Patience and positive reinforcement will go a long way in helping your new family member feel safe and secure and have trust in you.

3 (Veeks 🗳

This is when your new pet starts to learn routines. Use praise and lots of treats to reinforce good behaviors and create positive associations. You can slowly start to introduce dogs to new people and other animals in the home. Cats need a little longer, but there are



methods like scent swapping (mixing your resident pet's and your new cat's smells around the house to normalize them) that can help gradually introduce them to other animals in the home. You can always reintroduce, if need be, but it's good to go slow; first impressions are important to animals too!

3 Months 📽

This is the time it takes for most animals to feel completely at home! This would be a good time to start working on training for behavior or fun, or to further strengthen your bond. Continue to reward good behaviors and keep routines, because for animals - just like for people - "What you don't use, you lose." Please note that this is only a generalized rule to provide guidance for decompression, so be aware that every animal is different. Some may be more anxious or shut down and will require more time than three months, but the wait will be worth the while!





In 2023, we saw an increase in community participation with APS-FH as we expanded our community outreach and involvement hosting numerous groups at the shelter and participating in community events. APS-FH had a booth at the San Juan County Fair, marched in the 4th of July Parade, and joined Island Rec for their Pet Parade. We've welcomed youth and senior citizens into the shelter by hosting monthly meetings of the 4-H Cat Club and a children's book club, and shelter visits for Village at the Harbor residents. Our weekend Puppy and Kitten Socials

were popular events for potential adopters and those just wanting to snuggle and play with puppies and kittens. Two high school students completed their community projects through serving our shelter pets making enrichment items for the shelter including a homemade "snuffle mat" for the cats and a "flirt pole" for the dogs. Our social media presence has been consistent and our visibility has increased, helping us spread our mission and increase awareness of the importance and rewarding experience of adopting rescue pets.

For me, it began with Charlie. I first met him in April 2022 as I was donating the prescription dog food and medications that belonged to my beloved dog Tank after losing him to cancer. Charlie, a rather large and hairy black and white version of Tank was in the lobby! I had been grieving and desperately sought the company of a dog, especially one whose fur was so luxuriously like the one I'd been missing. After visiting a few times, I wanted to walk him. Diana encouraged me to volunteer, and that's what I did. So, as it goes, it began with a broken heart and my own need to fill that emptiness. In time, the love I received from the dogs calmed the fear of losing again, and with the support of staff, I had the motivation to continue walking through that lobby long after Charlie went home.

But now, it is different. It's more than the benefits I receive (which would fill several pages); it's knowing that I helped an elderly dog relieve herself, that Libby got to play her favorite game, that Ruby got to play ball for as long as she wanted, and that I can be the second person needed for dog playtime. A wagging tail, the pure joy of a walk, the gratitude shown in every movement, a small lick or a drenching one, the display of belly that says, "I feel comfortable with you," or a paw gently placed on my person...this is why I volunteer. Their needs are great, and they ask for so little. For as long as I'm able, I will give



them a little more sun, a run, the sound of birds, and the breeze that carries the smell of freedom and perhaps one day, a home.

Volunteer Opportunities

Shelter Volunteer

Assists with general shelter duties including cleaning, organizing, sorting, and helping shelter staff with special projects. May help socialize cats including brushing, petting, and implementing enrichment – our cats love and benefit from playtime. May help take a shelter dog on a long walk and/or play with them in the yard, create and implement enrichment activities, and/ or work with dogs on training as guided by our staff.

Facility Maintenance

General facility maintenance and repairs - we need you at the shelter and Treasure Hounds!

Clinic Aide

Assists Shelter Vet and Vet Tech pre, during, and postsurgery days, cares for animals recovering from surgery, cleans and maintains surgical suite and equipment.

Special Events

Helps at fundraising events and assists with set up, tear down, and event promotion.

Receptionist/Greeter

Greets customers and answers phones - retrieves appropriate staff to assist when necessary. Performs various clerical duties.

Foster Parent

Our Foster Program places current shelter animals in temporary homes. Foster families help to house ill or injured animals, animals stressed by being in a kennel, or underage puppies and kittens with or without a mom. Not only is this in the best interest of the individual animal, but it also provides more room at the shelter for additional animals in need.

Transport

Using the shelter van or personal vehicle of appropriate size, travels off island to take animals to partner shelters or pick up animals being transferred to our shelter from a partner shelter. Locations for pickups/ drop-offs vary from Anacortes, Skagit County, or the Greater Seattle area. Occasionally longer trips are necessary.

Treasure Hounds

Provides customer service at our upscale resale store - assisting customers while shopping, sorting, cleaning, pricing, setting up displays, and organizing donated merchandise. May assist with delivery and/or procurement of donations.

Caring for Pets and Our Community



APS-FH is committed to providing programs and services that:

- · Reduce pet overpopulation through spay/neuter resources
- Provide a safe haven and care for unwanted pets
- Offer adoption of homeless pets to those who truly care
- Protect animals from neglect, abuse, and abandonment
- Advance animal welfare through educational and direct assistance
- Promote a stronger sense for animal and human interaction
- Always adhere to our no-kill philosophy

While our mission is to "provide compassionate care and brighter futures to homeless animals," our mission naturally extends to pet owners as well.

The Animal Shelter

The Animal Protection Society-Friday Harbor (APS-FH) follows The Association of Shelter Veterinarians (ASV) Standards of Care in Animal Shelters ("guidelines") to provide the highest quality housing, medical, and behavioral care of pets living in the shelter. We adopt between 200-400 dogs and cats into loving homes each year. We also partner with the local Sheriff's Department to provide animal control, return to owner, and dog licensing services on San Juan Island.

Community Outreach and Humane Education

We aim to promote a deeper understanding of companion animals

and instill a sense of responsibility and empathy towards them. APS-FH provides a variety of avenues through which individuals of all ages have opportunities to connect with companion animals and explore the benefits of having them in our lives. Through community outreach events, interactive and hands-on experiences, volunteer opportunities, and trainings and workshops, we invite our community to actively contribute to the care and welfare of companion animals, gain a deeper understanding of the challenges faced by shelters and the needs of homeless pets, and learn about responsible pet ownership and the advantages of adopting pets from shelters. The program's goal is to create a society where animals are treated with love, care, and respect.

Pet Food Pantrv

The Pet Food Pantry is a community pet food bank established to help keep pets in their homes by providing cat and dog food



and other basic pet supplies for families in need of temporary assistance. We also partner with local human service organizations to get pet food and supplies to people who cannot make it to the pantry.

Participants must be San Juan County residents, be 18 years or older, have their pets spayed or neutered or be working toward having pets spayed or neutered. If they are not, APS-FH can help!

APS-FH gratefully accepts both cash and pet food donations to keep this program going.

Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) Program

As the humane and proven way to control feral cat populations, APS-FH promotes TNR. TNR is a free program that stops the breeding cycle of community cats by trapping, spaying/ neutering, and then returning the cats to their original location (when possible).

WHY IS TNR IMPORTANT? Cats can breed as early as 4 months of age and can produce multiple litters in one year. If nothing is done to sterilize colonies of community cats, the problem will most likely reach unmanageable levels and lead to unnecessary suffering.

Low-Cost Spay/ Neuter Clinic

Our low-cost spay/neuter clinic helps provide underserved San Juan County residents with



access to affordable spay/neuter surgery options for their dogs and cats, as well as additional services such as vaccines and microchipping. The clinic also assists other local rescue organizations and shelters by providing surgical services for their animals at a discounted rate, relieving the stress of adopting out unspayed/neutered pets into communities.

Our clinic runs once a week, typically on Tuesdays. Low-income community

members of San Juan County can call the shelter at (360)378-2158 to get more information, or to put their name on a short waiting list for the clinic.

Low-Cost Pet Wellness Clinic

Our low-cost wellness clinic allows underserved residents of San Juan County to have access to basic care for their pets.



Our clinic provides low-cost or free exams, vaccines, microchips and more. Services are limited to lowincome residents of San Juan County. These clinics run monthly or on an "as needed" basis.

**Please note: our wellness clinics are designed to offer preventative care to pets, and we are not able to treat sick or injured animals at these visits.

Mom's Last Litter

Mom's Last Litter is a free program designed to help pet owners safely and responsibly respond to accidental pregnancies and prevent future pregnancies.

Owners agree to foster the entire litter of puppies and kittens until each reaches the age and size required for spay/neuter surgery. At this time, the entire litter and the mother (as well as father, if owned) come to APS-FH to receive FREE spay/neuter surgeries. After surgery, the parent animals return to the owner, and the entire litter remains at APS-FH to be matched with forever homes.

Transport Program

APS-FH transport program works with other shelters, rescues, and transport organizations to safely transfer cats and dogs out of high-kill shelters, over-impacted, under-resourced, and disaster areas into the APS-FH shelter for adoption. We prioritize Washington-based shelters/rescues when the need is prevalent.

Foster Care Program

The foster care program places orphaned, pregnant, newborn, injured, sick, and under-socialized pets into private homes for temporary housing. Some of the shelter's most vulnerable residents benefit from foster care, which provides them with time outside of the shelter to decompress. Foster care gives us an opportunity to learn more about the pet by providing a glimpse into how they behave in a home setting. The APS-FH shelter is limited in space and the foster care program expands our capacity to help homeless pets.

Short-Term Emergency Housing for Pets

APS-FH offers shortterm emergency housing for pets within our shelter as well as in available foster homes, when possible. This service is provided to




support individuals facing temporary crises or unexpected transitions. We collaborate with various local human service organizations that refer clients to our program and help determine low-income eligibility. This program is based on space availability and the shelter's capacity for care.

The Grey Muzzle Medical Fund

This medical fund is made possible by a grant from the Grey Muzzle Organization to help low-income pet owners access regular and specialty veterinary care and prescriptions for their senior dogs by providing up to \$1000 per dog (this is a limited fund and may not always be available), paid directly to vet clinics and vet hospitals. We partner with local human service organizations that refer clients to our program and help determine lowincome eligibility.

Cremation Services

Pet loss can be traumatizing, heartbreaking, stressful, and sometimes expensive. APS-FH is proud to announce that we have partnered with Radiant Heart After-Care for Pets to provide compassionate and affordable cremation services to San Juan Island residents. Radiant Heart, located in Bellingham, Washington, is a pet



funeral home with on-site cremation, offering personal and respectful care for you and your pet. They provide eco-friendly cremation and traditional flame cremation as well as many additional products and services to honor your pet.

Radiant Heart visits APS-FH multiple times a month; therefore, your loved one's cremains are always returned in a timely manner. Cremation services are currently available to all community members regardless of income status; prices range depending on the types of cremation (communal versus private), size of the pet, and any additional services requested. Call APS-FH to learn more about this new service and visit Radiant Heart's website at radiant-heart.net to learn more about their process.

APS-FH does not currently offer euthanasia services to owned pets. Any pets brought in for cremation services will have to have passed away naturally or been humanely euthanized by your regular vet.

Missing/Found Pets

If your pet goes missing or if you've found a pet, what do you do? Let APS-FH know! We are here to assist and offer advice with reuniting pets with their guardians. Visit our website at apsfh.com for more information on what to do if your pet goes missing or if you've found a pet.

Funding by the Numbers



In November 2023, an independent financial audit was completed for the financial position of APS-FH as of December 31, 2022. We engaged in this audit to provide donors and grantors the highest level of assurance that our financial statements are fairly presented and free of misstatements. The auditor reported "the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the organization as of December 31, 2022, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We are pleased to share these results with all our supporters.

Treasure Hounds is an upscale resale shop with home décor, furniture, and collectibles. It supports APS-FH by providing 23% of total annual funding.

Spacious and conveniently located, Treasure Hounds is the perfect setting to shop for the vast array of gentlyused treasures. It is also home to the Pet Food Pantry, a community pet food bank to help keep pets in their homes by providing pet food for families in need.

Invest in APS-FH's Treasure Hounds Investment

The rented space for Treasure Hounds at 365-C Spring Street, Friday Harbor was put on the market in 2021. After an unsuccessful search for alternative rental property, the board conducted an in-depth financial analysis of purchasing the condo space. The favorable financial analysis combined with a plan to continue to develop the Treasure Hounds business strongly supported the decision to purchase.

Treasure Hounds continues to outperform expectations. 2023 gross sales of \$182,140 were up 12% over 2022. This provided net income of \$131,346, a 21.5% return on investment on the purchase price of the condo space.

With the success of Treasure Hounds so fundamental to supporting our shelter operations, we have now turned our focus to paying off the interest-only loan that matures in early 2027. As of Dec 31, 2023, we've raised \$99,000 from our board and advisory board, and have set aside \$50,000 in operating income from Treasure Hounds to pay off our loan. We hope to raise the additional \$351,000 needed by December 2026. We greatly appreciate all donations and pledges! It was also an opportunity to honor our special friends Bob and Lissa McDowell who have done so much for APS-FH over the years. During the dinner, we shared a touching video called, "Tori's Story," about a dog named Tori (short for Victorious) who had been abandoned, in bitter cold weather, at a Burger King Restaurant in Eastern Washington. Tori sat for three days waiting for his family to return, but they never came. Eventually, Tori was trapped and transported to APS-FH where he received medical care and was placed in a foster home until he was adopted. It was a wildly successful evening for APS-FH. In the end, we raised an incredible \$163,251.

Grant Spotlight: The Grey Muzzle Organization

In 2023, APS-FH was honored to receive a grant of \$10,500 from The Grey Muzzle Organization, which saves and improves the lives of at-risk senior dogs by providing funding and resources to animal welfare groups nationwide.

19.5% of our dog intakes in 2023 were seniors. This funding helped APS-FH provide special care to senior dogs in the shelter and help low-income SJI families care for their senior dogs. Working in coordination with other local nonprofits and the County Sheriff's Department we were able to reach families most in need in our community.

2023 Grey Muzzle grant funding allowed APS-FH to achieve the following:

- Provide specialized medical and dental care for senior dogs in the shelter.
- Offer short-term emergency boarding for the senior dogs of people experiencing emergencies or unexpected transitions.
- Help low-income community members access pet food, pet supplies, and medical care for their senior dogs.

Story of a Dog Helped by APS-FH through the Grey Muzzle Grant...

Greta, an 18-year-old Chihuahua mix, faced uncertainty when her owner was hospitalized and ultimately couldn't return home. Alone in an apartment with daily check-ins from a caregiver, Greta's situation changed when the landlord



insisted she couldn't stay unattended. The caregiver, aware of a client willing but unable to afford the care for a senior dog, reached out to APS-FH. Thanks to Grey Muzzle funding, APS-FH took Greta in, arranging for her to live in a long-term foster home provided by the client, covering all necessary care for the rest of her life.

Upon arrival at APS-FH, Greta underwent a health exam, received vaccines, and completed senior bloodwork, proving her a good candidate for dental surgery despite needing 13 teeth extracted. All her growths, once removed, were found to be benign. Greta quickly adapted to her new home, forming a strong bond with her foster mom, and even befriending the resident cat. Her transformation from a timid to a more confident dog was remarkable, likely aided by the relief from previously untreated dental pain. APS-FH commits to supporting Greta and her foster mom, grateful for the Grey Muzzle Organization and the community's generosity, ensuring Greta's happiness and health in her final chapter.


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Why I support APS-FH
